
Lunch Bunch



Book Sale

Although it may seem early to be thinking about our book sale, there are some new developments to report.

While Book Sale Committee members have not officially begun collecting for our annual sale, we have received two substantial donations of children's books. When Fennville bookstore owner Nathan Green closed his store in August, he donated 40 boxes of children's books to AAUWSH. In addition, after LMC daycare owner Karla Pepple retired in November and closed both South Haven and Benton Harbor locations, she donated 30 boxes of children's books. Because of these donations and a few others, we have enough books to hold a separate pop up Children's Book Sale over Memorial Day weekend.

Locals and tourists alike look forward to the AAUWSH book sale, and our organization has a long-standing tradition of holding its sale at the First Congregational Church. The church has been a vital component of our sale, and we have benefitted from the kindness of its board members who have allowed us to use their space for a nominal fee. And, we are fortunate that for the past several years, one of our members has generously donated \$500 for the use of the church. However, because the church's expenses have increased, church board members have asked us to pay more to use their facilities in 2025.

Book Sale Committee Co-chairs Jean Bevevino and Edna Kent report that AAUWSH will be charged \$1,500 to rent the same spaces used in 2024 for the 2025 August book sale, and \$200 for the May 24, 2025 children's book sale (to be held in the parking lot of the church). Although costs for our 2025 book sale have increased, all expenses for the May and August sales (church rental, Blueberry Festival fee, printing, publicity, office supplies, etc.) will be paid by two generous individuals. Donations from AAUWSH member Mary Pietenpol and South Haven realtor Amy O'Sullivan will cover all costs associated with both book sales! This means that 100% of the money we make at the book sales will go directly to the scholarship fund. AAUW SH is so fortunate to have the support of our members and our community!

The Children's Book Sale will take place in the First Congregational Church parking lot Saturday, May 24 from 9 - 1. We'll need help setting up tables and unpacking/arranging books from 8 -9 on the 24th. We'll also need people to work as cashiers, baggers, and table monitors during the sale. Sign-up sheets to help with the Children's book sale will be available in the spring.

For the August book sale,

•Book donation barrels will go out the week of June 30 at the First Congregational Church, Wolverine (ACE) Hardware, the Bronson Wellness Center and the Senior Center. (If AAUWSH members have books to donate, please bring them directly to the church beginning June 30.) Designated committee members will pick up books from these locations, but any AAUWSH member is encouraged to take books to the church if you see an overflowing barrel.


Book sorting will take place July 2, 9, 16, 23 and 30 from 9-11 a.m. (you're welcome for either or both hours). Sorting is a great way to connect with other members, and the more hands, the better!
Move and unpack the sorted boxes of books on Thursday, August 7. We'll need all hands on deck!
First day of the sale is Friday, August 8 from 8-4 (early admission is at 8 a.m.), doors open at 9. Second day of the sale is Saturday, August 9, from 9-2. Sign-up sheets to work the sale will be available on book sorting mornings in July, at the Annual Meeting in May, and at the Scholarship Celebration in June.

• As soon as the sale is done on August 9, volunteers will be needed to box up unsold books, flatten boxes for storage, put away tables, do general clean-up, and take leftover books to various donation sites as the Fennville bookshop owner is no longer available to take our leftover books. Parent Resource Center

Our AAUW members support the Parent Resource Center, which provides educational and emotional opportunities for teen parents.



Located next to the Liberty Hyde Bailey Museum on land that was once an apple orchard, the Center provides rooms for baby and child play as well as classrooms for the young parents.

In addition to providing a monthly meal for young parents, this year they asked if someone could help with their monthly diaper distributions. Not knowing how large or heavy a month's supply of disposable diapers would be, I said I'd do it. It's been an enjoyable experience getting to know the mothers (and sometime grandmothers) who come the first Monday of each month.

Although the Resource Center orders diapers in large bags - much bigger than those bags sold by Amazon or Wal Mart, the Center is happy to accept any size package. So if you have diapers left over from family visits - or just would like to help out the Center - drop them off on a Monday or Tuesday afternoon. or bring them to the Congregational Church and I'll deliver them for you. Size 5 seems to always be the most needed. Any help would be appreciated.
