

Summary of Michigan Results from the Recent Election

I would like to summarize the key statistics and outcomes for Michigan in the recent election: Donald Trump won the presidential race in Michigan, marking a shift from the 2020 election, where Joe Biden secured Michigan with 51% of the votes compared to Trump's 48%. This year Trump won with 52% of the vote.

Michigan has 15 electoral votes, making it a crucial battleground state. The state has swung in its support for presidents over the last three election cycles, voting for Biden in 2020, Trump in 2016, and Obama in 2012.

In the Senate race, Democrat Elissa Slotkin narrowly won the open seat vacated by retiring Democratic Senator Debbie Stabenow. Slotkin received about 76.33% of the Democratic primary votes.

Two open House seats, previously held by Democrats, were considered toss-ups: the 7th Congressional District (formerly held by Slotkin) and the 8th Congressional District (formerly held by Dan Kildee).

- 1. In Michigan's 7th Congressional District, Republican Tom Barrett defeated Democrat Curtis Hertel, flipping the seat from Democratic to Republican control.
- 2. In Michigan's 8th Congressional District, Democrat Kristen McDonald Rivet won the open seat, defeating Republican Paul Junge. This district was previously represented by Democrat Dan Kildee, who did not seek re-election. These two races were among the most closely watched in Michigan, as they represented potential shifts in the balance of power in the U.S. House of Representatives. The 7th District flip contributed to Republicans gaining control of more congressional seats in Michigan, with the final tally being 7 seats for Republicans and 6 for Democrats.

Voter turnout was significant, with 3.4 million Michigan voters casting their ballots early, while 2.2 million voted on Election Day. This high turnout led to long lines in some areas, with some polling places remaining open past 8 p.m. to accommodate voters in line. However, by Election Day, nearly 45% of active registered voters had already cast a ballot. Women represented 55% of the early vote, compared to 45% of men.

The state implemented new voting policies for the 2024 election, including:

- 9 or more days of early voting
- Expanded options for returning absentee ballots
- Improved absentee ballot tracking
- Permanent absentee voting option
- Expanded options for voter ID

These changes were aimed at speeding up the election process, though final unofficial results were not available until midday on Wednesday following the election.

Comparison to 2020:

The total turnout of 5.6 million voters in 2024 was somewhat higher than in the 2020 presidential election. As of the most recent update, Michigan had 8,435,960 registered voters.

New Voter Registration:

Nearly 22,000 new voters registered and voted on Election Day, with many in East Lansing, Ann Arbor, Grand Rapids, and Detroit.

Michigan has a large Arab American population, which played a role in the election dynamics, particularly regarding foreign policy issues. While they shifted from the Democrats, 18.7% voted for the Green candidate.

Our Endowment at Community Foundation for Southeast Michigan

It has been a while since we have discussed our endowment at the Community Foundation for Southeast Michigan. When it grew to \$100,000, we started taking distributions from it. It was set up so that we could work smarter and not harder. No donation is too small or too big.

There are a number of ways to give: Direct gifts of cash, stocks, bonds, real estate; Bequests by will or living trust; Name AAUWNN Endowment Fund as a beneficiary in your life insurance or retirement plan; A Charitable Gift Annuity lets you receive tax benefits or donate cash or property now, while receiving a fixed income for life; or Set up a Charitable Remainder Trust.

For those of you with IRAs who have to take Required Minimum Distributions (RMD), a good way to reduce your income is to make a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) to the Community Foundation for Southeast Michigan for our endowment. You must notify the trustee of your IRA of your intention because the donation must go directly from the trustee of your IRA to the Community Foundation for Southeast Michigan. You will then receive a letter saying the donation has been made to give to your tax preparer. However, you cannot take the donation as a charitable contribution. Remember you are not taking it as income.

If you just want to make a check out to Community Foundation for Southeast Michigan, write AAUW-NN in the memo line and mail to AAUW-NN, P.O. Box 511, Northville, MI 48167. This would not be a QCD.



For those of you who are new to our branch our "Remember the Ladies Program" was developed around a quote from a letter Abigail Adams sent to her husband John: "I long to hear that you have declared an independency. And, by the way, in the new code of laws which I suppose it will be necessary for you to make, I desire you would remember the ladies and be more generous and favorable to them than your ancestors." – Abigail Adams to John Adams, March 31, 1776.

During the year, AAUW Northville-Novi collects donations for the purchase of books on women in history. The donation is sent to the school media specialist who selects a woman's biography, history, or related resource based on the needs of that particular media center and places the order. A receipt for the tax deduction is then sent to the donor from the media specialist. Books or other media may also be purchased in honor of or in memory of a loved one, in which case, a book plate is provided and placed in the book or other media. A certificate is also sent to the family of the loved one or of the person being honored notifying them of the donation. If it is a gift, it is sent to the person themselves.


