
Women's History

DEI Update

On February 4, the DEI Committee hosted MaryJo Schnell, Executive Director of the Outcenter of Southwest Michigan. This Non-profit organization provides services to the LGBTQ community in Berrien, Cass and Van Buren Counties. The event was open to all AAUW members and guests. We had a good turnout with over 20 people attending.



MaryJo summarized the current political climate since the National election and discussed the current administration's attack on all DEI programs, including their LGBTO

community, and transgender people in particular. She said that banning DEI programs is an attempt to impose "re-segregation."

Based on surveys in their tri-county area, "20% of 13-18-year-olds identify as LGBTQ, and half of that group have at some point considered selfharm, not due to who they are, but due to how they are treated". The Outcenter provides a safe space for these teens through their various support groups, Pride Events and other activities. Their mission is to change "hearts, minds and policies." The Outcenter offers numerous education and training programs for organizations including schools, healthcare facilities and businesses. Their partners include the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, Corewell Health and Bronson Health. They have a significant CDC federal grant focusing on sexual violence prevention which may be at risk due to federal funding changes. Especially now, private funding is important to allow them to continue their important work. They will gratefully accept donations at outcenter.org.

Rapid Responders

PPC recently sent each AAUW SH member a Rapid Responder Message regarding contacting our elected officials regarding issues relating to our mission. As a reminder -

We are being hit daily by Executive Actions with serious consequences for women and girls, as well as our entire nation. PPC is providing you with tools to immediately call your elected officials when you learn about an action that would adversely affect



women and girls.

Commentators have stated that the phone calls to elected officials made a difference. Pick up the phone and call whenever you learn of an issue affecting women and girls.

Staff count the number of calls and if they are for or against an action. This is important information that makes a difference.

The number of calls matter. If you speak to a staff member, state your name and address and explain your position succinctly (please refrain from the temptation to curse). If you reach an answering machine, do the same.

AAUWSH Scholarship Recipient Update: 2023 Pathfinder and 2024 Achievement Award Recipient Arianna Rouse DeHoyos is a sophomore at Lake Superior State University. Arianna's Connection to AAUWSH is Kerry Hagy, Executive Director of the South Haven Center for the Arts. Kerry has known Arianna for several years as Ari is an artist and long-time volunteer at the Art Center. When they spoke over the holidays, Kerry was given permission to update members on

Arianna's college experience so far.

Arianna got married last year and said she and her husband enjoy living in on-campus housing. Ari said that her fall semester went well, and that she changed her major from education to political science with a concentration in public administration. Arianna said that this major gives her more options, and if she decides she wants to be a teacher after all, she can enroll in a one-year teacher certification program after earning her degree in political science.

2025 AAUWSH Scholarship Applications:

AAUWSH is one of 24 local organizations using the South Haven Community Foundation's common scholarship application system. Submitting their information to one shared website makes it easier for the students to apply for scholarships, resulting in an increase in the number of applicants for local scholarships.

In early March, AAUWSH Scholarship Committee members **Stephanie Timmer, Sandy Olsen, Amy Kilbridge and Nadine Godin-Nassaney** will begin reviewing the applications and selecting three recipients for the 2025 AAUWSH scholarships. Information from AAUW Michigan:

In January, Scholarship Committee Chairperson **Teresa Gibbons** attended the AAUW of Michigan webinar, *It's in the Numbers! What Your Branch Needs to Know about Finances, Fundraising, and Scholarships.*

According to AAUWMI VP of Finance Sheila Blair, if any AAUW branch were to give money to a college or university and instruct the school staff to select a scholarship recipient on behalf of the branch, then that AAUW branch could not require the college/university to award its scholarship to a female. However, this is not the process our branch uses. AAUWSH does not give our money to a college/university for them to disperse. Instead, **AAUWSH Scholarship Committee members** review our scholarship applications and select our scholarship recipients. Then, our organization sends a scholarship check to the individual college/university where the girl is enrolled. This means that we can determine who we award our scholarships to, affirming that we are free to provide scholarships exclusively to females.

In Black History Month, we were proud to celebrate the achievements of remarkable AAUW alumnae like Indira Bailey, Ph.D. AAUW's fellowship award helped support

Dr. Bailey's work on the underrepresentation of Black women artists in K-12 teaching resources and its impact on Black women art educators' inequities in education. She is an Assistant Professor of Art Education at Claflin University, an HBCU where she integrates social justice and art education to prepare future art educators to develop an inclusive and diverse curriculum. Her latest book chapter, "Learning About African American Women Artists Intersecting Identities: Critical Conversations Using Intersectionality as an Analytic Tool in Art Education" in The Intersectionality of Critical Identities in Art Education, highlights the significance of Black women artists lived experiences.

But the fight for educational equity isn't over. Supporting women in higher education has always been at the heart of AAUW's mission, and with your help, we will continue to rise.
